A Bill to Require DNA Evidence for Death Penalty Sentencing

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** No convicted criminal shall be sentenced to death unless
3. DNA evidence linking the criminal to the crime comprises a
4. central element of that conviction, as determined by the judge
5. overseeing the case.

6. **Section 2** Any inmate currently sentenced to death and awaiting the
7. completion of that sentence whose conviction was not
8. significantly predicated on DNA evidence shall have their
9. sentence commuted to life in prison. District attorneys with
10. jurisdiction in the court where the crime was originally tried
11. shall be responsible for making these determinations and shall
12. have one year from the passage of this legislation to do so.

13. **Section 3** If a judge is found to have violated this legislation,
14. this shall serve as compelling grounds for that judge's
15. impeachment

16. **Section 4** This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of
17. Justice.

18. **Section 5** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.

19. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
20. declared null and void.

FairTax Act of 2023

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** This bill imposes a national sales tax on the use or
3. consumption in the United States of taxable property or services
4. in lieu of the current income taxes, payroll taxes, and estate
5. and gift taxes.
6. **Section 2** The rate of the sales tax will be 23% in 2025, with
7. adjustments to the rate in subsequent years. Under the bill,
8. family members who are lawful U.S. residents receive a monthly
9. sales tax rebate (Family Consumption Allowance) based upon
10. criteria related to family size and poverty guidelines.
11. **Section 3** The states have the responsibility for administering,
12. collecting, and remitting the sales tax to the Treasury.
13. **Section 4** This bill shall go into place for the fiscal year of 2025.
14. **Section 5** All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy
15. shall hereby be declared null and void.

No Mask Mandates Act of 2023

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** This bill nullifies existing federal mask mandates and
3. prohibits future actions to require individuals to wear face
4. masks to respond to COVID-19 and other public health emergencies.
5. **Section 2** Specifically, this bill nullifies: A. the executive
6. order issued on January 20, 2021, that addresses the use of face
7. masks in federal buildings and on federal lands; and B. the
8. emergency order issued by the Centers for Disease Control and
9. Prevention on January 29, 2021, that required the use of face
10. masks on public transportation conveyances and in transportation
11. hubs until the order was struck down by a court on April 18, 2022.
12. **Section 3** Congress shall oversee the enforcement of the bill along
13. with the specific enforcement mechanism.
14. **Section 4** This bill shall go into effect immediatly upon passage.
15. **Section 5** All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy
16. shall hereby be declared null and void.
