

State vs. Ethan Reynolds
Fact Pattern:

In the digital realm of cryptocurrency, the town of Millbrook was rocked by a significant cybercrime on November 12th, 2023. A substantial theft of Bitcoin, valued at over \$10 million, occurred from the virtual wallets of several residents, including Samuel Wilson, a prominent local businessman.
