

A Bill to Prohibit Human Composting

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** The process of human composting, also known as natural
3. organic reduction, shall be prohibited in the United States.

4. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Human composting refers
5. to the process of turning human remains into soil through
6. controlled decomposition. B. Burial alternatives such as
7. cremation and traditional burials are not affected by this
8. legislation.

9. **Section 3** The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will oversee
10. enforcement of this policy. Any facility found offering human
11. composting services will face fines of up to \$100,000.

12. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026.

13. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
14. declared null and void.

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A Bill to Ban the Sale of Energy Drinks to Minors

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** The sale of energy drinks to individuals under the age of
3. 18 shall be prohibited in the United States.

4. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Energy drinks are
5. defined as beverages that contain high levels of caffeine and
6. other stimulants, such as taurine or guarana, and are marketed to
7. boost energy. B. Sale includes in-store purchases, vending
8. machine sales, and online orders.

9. **Section 3** The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will oversee
10. enforcement of this legislation. Retailers that sell energy
11. drinks to minors will face a fine of \$500 per violation.

12. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025.

13. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
14. declared null and void.

A Bill to Require Transparency in Political Advertising

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** All political advertisements on television, radio, and
3. digital platforms must clearly disclose the entity funding the ad.

4. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Political

5. advertisements refer to any paid content promoting or opposing a

6. candidate, party, or ballot measure. B. Disclosure must include

7. the name of the funding organization and the top three donors

8. contributing more than \$10,000.

9. **Section 3** The Federal Election Commission (FEC) shall enforce this

10. law. A. Political ads that fail to disclose funding sources will

11. be subject to fines of up to \$500,000 per violation. B. Repeat

12. offenders may be barred from running political ads for up to

13. five years.

14. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026.

15. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby

16. declared null and void.
