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A Bill to Ban Microplastics in Consumer Products

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** The production and sale of products containing
3. microplastics shall be prohibited in the United States.
4. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Microplastics are
5. plastic particles smaller than five millimeters that do not break
6. down naturally. B. Consumer products include cosmetics,
7. toothpaste, cleaning supplies, and synthetic clothing that
8. release microplastics into the environment.
9. **Section 3** The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will oversee
10. enforcement. A. Companies that continue to manufacture or sell
11. microplastic-containing products will be fined up to \$50,000 per
12. violation. B. Grants will be provided to businesses that develop
13. biodegradable alternatives.
14. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.
15. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
16. declared null and void.

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A Bill to Ban Glitter That Harms the Environment

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** The sale of non-biodegradable plastic glitter shall be
3. banned in the United States.
4. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Non-biodegradable
5. plastic glitter refers to tiny plastic particles used for
6. decoration that do not break down naturally in the
7. environment. B. Biodegradable alternatives such as plant-based
8. glitter will still be allowed.
9. **Section 3** The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will oversee
10. enforcement of this law. Companies that continue to sell plastic
11. glitter will face a \$5,000 fine per violation.
12. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2027.
13. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
14. declared null and void.

A Bill to Establish a "Right to Repair" for Electronics

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** All electronics manufacturers must allow consumers and
3. independent repair shops to repair their products without
4. restriction.

5. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Right to repair refers
6. to the ability of consumers to fix or modify their purchased
7. electronic devices without voiding warranties or losing
8. functionality. B. Electronics manufacturers include companies
9. that produce smartphones, computers, tablets, and other digital
10. devices.

11. **Section 3** The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) shall oversee
12. enforcement. A. Companies that refuse to provide necessary
13. repair tools, manuals, or parts shall be fined up to \$100,000
14. per violation. B. Consumers shall retain full ownership rights
15. over devices they purchase, including the right to modify
16. software.

17. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.

18. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
