

A Bill to Ban Online Gambling

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** The use of online gambling websites, games, and any other
3. form of online gambling shall be banned in the United States.

4. This also includes the use of real life currency to purchase
5. "loot boxes" in video games.

6. **Section 2** Online gambling refers to betting or playing games of
7. chance or skill for money, by using a remote device such as a
8. tablet, computer, smartphone, or any mobile phone with an
9. internet connection. Loot Boxes are virtual containers in a
10. video game that the player could buy for a chance to win an item
11. in game.

12. **Section 3** The National Gambling Control Commission will be created
13. to oversee the enforcement of the ban, working with State
14. gambling commissions to ensure that online gambling sites phase
15. out in compliance with the implementation date.

16. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2028.

17. **Section 5** All laws that are in conflict with this legislation are
18. hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Zoos

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** All zoos will be banned in the United States. Animals in
3. zoos will be released into the wild if possible. If that is not
4. possible, animals will be reallocated to animal sanctuaries,
5. which are not affected by this bill.

6. **Section 2** A zoo is defined as a place where wild animals are kept
7. in enclosures, particularly for the purpose of entertainment for
8. humans. An animal sanctuary is an area that is designated for
9. the protection of wild animals (refuge), where animals can breed
10. without interference or danger and hunting and fishing are
11. either prohibited or strictly controlled.

12. **Section 3** The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA),
13. specifically the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service
14. (APHIS) will enforce the implementation of this new legislation.
15. The government will subsidize the transfer of animals to
16. sanctuaries. Zoo owners and employees who do not comply will
17. face forceful closure and a sentence of 10 years in jail.

18. **Section 4** The legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2030.

19. **Section 5** All other laws in conflict with this policy shall hereby
20. be declared null and void.

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A Bill to Restrict the Age of Government Officials

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** The federal government shall restrict the age of
3. government officials in office to a maximum of seventy years of
4. age. A government official may finish their existing term if they
5. turn the retirement age during an existing term. Positions that
6. are held for life will now end upon the 70th birthday of the
7. person who obtains the position. Positions that are appointed by
8. the President would be reselected upon the person who occupies
9. the position's birthday.

10. **Section 2** A form of office is defined as a position held at the
11. federal level. It includes Supreme Court Justices and all
12. positions in the Federal Judiciary, Congress, the Presidency,
13. and heads of the Federal Bureaucracy.

14. **Section 3** The Government Accountability Office (GAO) will oversee
15. enforcement along with the specific enforcement mechanism. The
16. Federal Election Commission (FEC) will be responsible for
17. performing checks of each candidate's physical birth certificate
18. when they register to run for office. Funding for this bill will
19. be allocated by the FEC to pay existing workers to check and
20. enforce that each candidate has valid forms of identification.

21. **Section 4** The legislation will take effect on July 1st, 2026.

22. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
23. declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Factory Farming

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** The practice, use, and marketing of products made using
3. factory farming (Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations) shall be
4. banned in the United States of America.

5. **Section 2** According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services,
6. Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs) are agricultural
7. meat, dairy, or egg facilities where animals are kept and raised
8. in confinement. Instead of grazing or eating in pastures, fields,
9. or on range lands, animals are given food.

10. **Section 3** A. United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and
11. the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will be responsible
12. for the enforcement of this ban. B. Fines and a shutdown of
13. operations may be implemented for manufacturers and consumers
14. not following the ban.

15. **Section 4** This bill shall take effect on January 1st, 2030.

16. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
17. declared null and void.

A Resolution to Encourage Museums to Return Artifacts to their Country of Origin

1. **WHEREAS**, Museums nationwide have taken copious amounts of artifacts
2. from their countries of origin, and
3. **WHEREAS**, Multiple countries are still missing key artifacts to
4. their heritage, affecting our relations with them and depriving
5. the original country of its past its past cultural identity, and
6. **WHEREAS**, this denies citizens of these countries the ability to
7. connect with and see their own history, creating an uneven global
8. distribution of economic and historical educational
9. opportunities, and
10. **WHEREAS**, the return of control of these artifacts to their
11. countries of origin will allow these countries to gain economic
12. and educational benefits of these artifacts, be it
13. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled should encourage and
14. incentivize museums nationwide to send back artifacts to their
15. country of origin; and if a limited amount of artifacts are not
16. returned to their country of origin, museums should establish an
17. agreement with the country, where they rent the artifacts at a
18. cost on the condition of the eventual return of said artifact.
