

A Bill to Limit Personal Drone Flights Over Private Property

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** Personal drones shall not be flown over private property
3. without the property owner's permission.

4. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Personal drones are
5. small, remote-controlled flying devices operated by individuals
6. for recreation or photography. B. Private property includes
7. homes, backyards, and land not open to the public.

8. **Section 3** The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) will oversee
9. enforcement. Violators will be fined up to \$2,000 per incident.

10. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.

11. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
12. declared null and void.

A Resolution to Limit Celebrity Participation in Political Advertisements

1. **WHEREAS**, Celebrity endorsements in political campaigns may cause
2. voters to focus on popularity rather than policy; and
3. **WHEREAS**, These endorsements can overshadow more qualified but less
4. famous candidates; and
5. **WHEREAS**, Politics should focus on ideas, not fame; now, therefore,
6. be it
7. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled support limits on the
8. use of celebrity endorsements in political advertisements.
9. Introduced for Congressional Debate by NOF.

A Bill to Ban Dynamic Pricing in Live Event Ticket Sales

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** Live event ticket sellers shall be prohibited from using
3. dynamic pricing to change ticket prices based on demand after
4. sales begin.

5. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Dynamic pricing is when
6. ticket prices automatically increase as more people try to buy
7. them. B. Live events include concerts, sports games, and theater
8. performances.

9. **Section 3** The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) will enforce this law.
10. Sellers who break the law will face a \$10,000 fine per event.

11. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2027.

12. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
13. declared null and void.

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A Resolution to Support Restrictions on Fast Fashion Imports

1. **WHEREAS**, Fast fashion leads to large amounts of clothing waste and
2. pollution; and
3. **WHEREAS**, Cheap, fast-produced clothing often relies on unfair labor
4. practices in other countries; and
5. **WHEREAS**, Reducing fast fashion imports may encourage more
6. sustainable clothing choices; now, therefore, be it
7. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled support efforts to limit
8. the import of fast fashion clothing into the United States.
9. Introduced for Congressional Debate by NOF.

A Bill to Require Labels on Artificially Enhanced Foods

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** All foods that are artificially enhanced to improve
3. color, taste, or shelf life must display a clear label to inform
4. consumers.

5. **Section 2** For the purposes of this bill: A. Artificially enhanced
6. foods are foods that have added chemicals or treatments not
7. naturally found in the product. B. Labels must clearly state:
8. "This product contains artificial enhancements."

9. **Section 3** The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will oversee
10. enforcement. Companies that fail to properly label their
11. products will be fined \$5,000 per violation.

12. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.

13. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
14. declared null and void.
