

A Bill to Enact Federal Participatory Budgeting

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. Individuals shall determine the allocation of their paid federal taxes for discretionary spending when filing their annual federal tax return. Future congressional annual budget resolutions shall reflect the allocations set forth by the individual income tax returns.

SECTION 2. Discretionary spending” shall be defined as spending that is not mandated on a multi-year basis by existing legislation.

SECTION 3. This bill shall be enforced by the Internal Revenue Service.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect April 15, 2020.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban the Immigration and Customs Enforcement

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** Any action carried out or done by the ICE is prohibited, therefore, the
2 entire agency is completely eliminated.

3 **SECTION 2.** The ban will be applied to all agencies within the ICE.

4 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Homeland Security shall oversee the
5 enforcement of this bill.

6 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect January 1, 2020.

7 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Bill to Raise the U.S.'s Minimum Wage

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The United States will raise the federal minimum wage from \$7.25 to \$15.

SECTION 2. This applies to all 50 states, and all U.S Territories.

SECTION 3. The U.S. Department of Labor shall oversee the enforcement and implementation of this bill.

SECTION 4. This bill shall take effect on October 1st, 2020.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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The 2019 SCJFL 2nd Quarter Debate Tournament Legislation #4

A Bill to Lower Requirements to Request the Teacher Loans Forgiveness Program

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** Requirements for the Teacher Loans Forgiveness Program shall be
2 lowered in order to decrease educator debts.

3 A. All teachers shall only need to teach full time for three consecutive
4 years to be eligible.

5 B. All Mathematics, Science, or Special Education teachers at secondary
6 schools are eligible to request \$18,000 at most, and teachers in other
7 subjects are still eligible to request a maximum amount of \$9,500.

8 **SECTION 2.** All other qualifications for the Teacher Loans Forgiveness Program shall
9 stay the same, ambiguous terms from the previous section are defined as
10 below:

11 A. Secondary schools are schools that intermediate between elementary
12 school and college and usually offering technical, vocational, or college-
13 preparatory courses. These schools may include but are not limited to
14 middle schools, junior high, or high schools.

15 B. Special Education is defined as the practice of educating students in a
16 way that addresses their individual differences and needs. These may
17 include but are not limited to the education of children with disabilities in
18 hearing, talking, focusing, seeing, walking, etc.

19 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Education will oversee the enforcement of this
20 legislation.

21 **SECTION 4.** This bill shall take effect on August 20, 2020.

22 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Bill to Provide Medicare for All

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The United States should establish a single-payer health program to ensure healthcare for all residents of the U.S.

A. Premiums, deductibles, co-payments, and other charges for covered services will be prohibited.

B. Private health insurers and employers may only offer coverage that is supplemental to, and not duplicative of, benefits provided under the program.

SECTION 2. Under a single-payer system, all residents of the U.S. would be covered for all medically necessary services, including doctor, hospital, preventive, long-term care, mental health, reproductive health care, dental, vision, prescription drugs, and medical supply costs.

SECTION 3. The Department of Health and Human Services shall oversee the implementation of this bill.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2022.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
