

A Bill to Allow Free College for All

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. All college shall be free in public universities.

SECTION 2. The tuition will be funded by a .1% tax on all stock and security transfers.

SECTION 3. The Department of Education will oversee this act.

SECTION 4. This Bill will go into effect on Jan 1, 2020.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Establish a Universal Healthcare System

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The United States federal government shall hereby establish a national single payer healthcare system.

SECTION 2. A single payer healthcare system shall be defined as a government operated tax-funded healthcare system that covers the cost of essential healthcare to all legal residents, with costs covered by a single public system.

SECTION 3. The Department of Health and Human Services shall be charged with implementation of this bill.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall go into effect at the start of fiscal year 2020.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Limit Gun Games

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The United States Federal Government will create a law that states that all interactive electronic games, Publicly or Privately designed, will be on probation for all adolescents until a certain age.

SECTION 2. The current age rating for violent games are for adolescents of 12 years of age. This bill will increase this rating to be suitable for adults at least 18 years of age. All registers of downloads or purchases of any of the games in the “violent” category found after the year 2020 will be fined with \$2500 to the government and immediate confiscation of the game(s).

SECTION 3. The Federal Trade Commission will enforce this bill. The money collected will revert to Cancer research.

SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2020

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation is hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to eliminate daylight savings time.

A Resolution to stop grocery markets from throwing away edible food.
